




Holy Eucharist: Did you know? This week's theme: Jesus, the Lamb of God

Today's Gospel is from John 1:29-34. Here we see St. John the Baptist proclaim that Jesus is the Lamb of God. "Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world." Jews of that day wouldn't fail to recognize the connection that John was making between the Passover Lamb, who was sacrificed to atone for sin and Jesus, the innocent, spotless victim who would be sacrificed on the Cross for our salvation.

Reflection: During the Mass just before we receive Holy Communion, we hear these words, "Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. Happy are we who are called to His supper." The Church echoes the words of John to recall the great sacrifice which Christ has made for us to atone for our sinfulness. But it also asks us to rejoice that we are called to receive Him in Holy Communion in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. As Catholic Christians we are blessed beyond telling to so intimately be united to Our Lord, as we are, when we receive Him in Holy Communion. This week we begin what is referred to as "Ordinary Time". Ordinary Time is far from unimportant or uninteresting. This season is called ordinary not because it is common but simply because the weeks of Ordinary Time are numbered. The Latin word "ordinalis" refers to numbers in a series which stems from the Latin word "ordo" which translates order. Thus, the numbered weeks of Ordinary Time, in fact, represent the ordered life of the Church, the period in which we live our lives neither feasting (Christmas and Easter seasons) or in more severe penance (Advent and Lent), but in watchfulness and expectation of the Second Coming of Christ. It is appropriate that the Gospel for this weekend features John the Baptist's acknowledgement of Christ as the "Lamb of God". For us, Ordinary Time is the part of

the year in which Christ, the Lamb of God, walks among us and transforms our lives. There is nothing "ordinary" about that! Ordinary Time begins on the Monday after the first Sunday after January 6, the Feast of the Epiphany, and the end of the liturgical season of Christmas. The first period of Ordinary Time runs until Ash Wednesday when the liturgical season of Lent begins. Both Lent and Easter Seasons fall outside of Ordinary Time, which resumes again on the Monday after Pentecost Sunday, the end of the Easter season. The second period of ordinary Time runs until the First Sunday of Advent, the beginning of another liturgical year. So Ordinary Time is not just a filler between the great feasts our Church celebrates. It is a season for living and reflecting on the messages those feasts hold for us as believers in Jesus Christ.

BRINGING SCRIPTURE TO LIFE - with Munroe Scott. I am looking forward to gathering again with you on the first Wednesday of February. The study will be



9 weeks in length and continue through to Holy Week. The meeting time will return to the evening

from 6:30-8:00 pm in the parish hall. Our study this time is the Gospel of Matthew. In preparation for our study it would be helpful to have read the gospel beforehand. There are 28 chapters in Matthew, and so, if you read a chapter a day through the month of January, you would easily accomplish this task. I know that many enjoyed our study of the Epistle to the Colossians in the fall and we hope that many more will join us for this lively study of God's word. All are welcome!
