Life can get better! What more can be said? We are all the stuff of stories; we are all characters, irreplaceable in our unique incarnation of God's great imagination. So, cherish your story, wherever it is leading you. Lent reminds us that is where Easter starts. Whatever is going on, for good or bad, is leading us to Jesus and the greatest story ever told! ## TAKE AWAY THE STONE. LAZARUS, COME

**OUT!** As we begin these final two weeks of Lent, referred to as Passiontide, our focus turns more and more to the great feasts of our salvation and the life-giving passion and death of our Savior, Jesus Christ. The resurrection of Lazarus foreshadows the resurrection of Jesus Himself. It is all about absolute faith and trust in the power of God. The prophet Ezekiel refers to the resurrection in which we will all share as a result of the coming of our Savior: "I will open your graves and have you rise from them...I have promised, and I will do it, says the Lord." It is a great mystery of faith in which we all share knowing that the promises made to us by God will be fulfilled. We are given the promise of eternal life. The Gospel reflects beautifully the humanity of Jesus, as his closest friend lays dying and Jesus Himself ministers to him. "And Jesus wept."

And not just to Lazarus, but to his sisters as well, bringing comfort and hope. When Jesus hears of Lazarus' death, He returns to bring consolation but also to remind all who were present that death is not an end and assures Martha and Mary that he will rise again. The miracle they witness only confirms His words to them. As Christians we live in the greatest of all hopes as we reflect on eternal life. These final days before Easter are important to us and call us to ask ourselves some of the most important questions: Am I ready to encounter the Lord? Am I ready to stand in judgment before the God who created and loves me? Do I take my faith seriously so as to walk in the path that Christ set for me? Hard questions that deserve hard and honest answers. Am I ready to walk the way to Calvary with my Savior or will



I be one in the crowd yelling "Crucify him!", or Peter who denies knowing the Christ, or the soldiers who brutally beat and nailed him to the cross taking the very last of his earthly possessions for themselves? These final days of Lent are a gift to us so that we can reflect on the way in which we are choosing to live the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This is the time to hold the cross of Christ in your hand and ponder all that the cross speaks to us about those things that are most important: our faith and our hope in eternal life because of His suffering and death. Use well these final days!

Next week will be Palm Sunday the beginning of Holy Week. Let us do our best to keep these sacred days and meaningful.
